THE FOUR OF RACISM

INSTITUTIONAL

Policies and practices that reinforce racist standards within a workspace or organization.

STRUCTURAL

Multiple institutions collectively upholding racist policies and practices, i.e. society.

Racism happens everywhere

Institutional- hiring policies, who does certain work, etc.

Structural- policies on visas, pay, promotions

Interpersonal- between individuals

Internalized- private beliefs, superiority of one group over another



INTERPERSONAL

Racist acts and microaggressions carried out from one person to another.

INTERNALIZED

The subtle and overt messages that reinforce negative beliefs and self-hatred in individuals.

- Knowing when to take risks
- Work within the context of our school and host country

- ISCA Lesson Share Project
- Meet Kids Where They Are
 - Ask questions
 - Allow questions to help you know where you need to spend some extra time
- Create a culture in the classroom/in your school whereby students can feel safe in expressing what they are feeling and thinking
- Think about both explicit conversation and implicit messaging (find links to curriculum, both counseling curriculum & other subject area curricula
- Parent Education book clubs, structured conversations, discussions.
- Use books! There are so many great books that will jump start conversations and share these with your school media/library teams
 - Book Read Aloud (Free)
 - <u>Resource Roundup: Talking to Kids About Racism</u>
 - Book List about Privilege






Supporting and Educating Teachers and Admin


Self-Care
